## COMPARING NOTES WITH NEW YORK'S CRIME FIGHTERS



Profile's **John Davies** joins the NYPD on his recent visit to New York, to compare notes on their Crimestoppers campaign.

It may look like Profile's National Infrastructure Director John Davies is having a brush with the law on his recent visit to the USA, but things are not always what they seem.

As our readers discovered in the last issue of *Silhouette*, John is Chairman of the Lancashire branch of Crimestoppers. A visit to the Big Apple was an unmissable opportunity to compare notes with officers of the New York Police Department (NYPD) to find out how Crimestoppers helps to reduce crime on the other side of the pond.

## **Anonymous**

Although it's now a familiar name in the UK, Crimestoppers actually originated in Albuquerque, New Mexico in 1976. Following a shooting during a robbery at a filling station, police set up an anonymous phone line so witnesses could come forward with information. Within 72 hours, arrests were made, but what amazed the local police force was the number of people giving information on other, unrelated crimes. The Crimestoppers concept was born.

Six years later, Detective Inspector Mike Cole from Norfolk Constabulary learnt about the scheme on a police visit to Peoria, Illinois. He was impressed with the way information was given anonymously, spurred on by the possibility of earning a reward put up by local businesses.

## **Norfolk pioneers**

On his return to Great Yarmouth, DI Cole submitted a report to his Chief Superintendent and the Chief Constable, who gave their approval for a Norfolk scheme. Locals like Jim Carter, Manager of the town's Woolworths store, were quick to respond, recognising the Crimestoppers initiative as a good opportunity to get the community involved in crime-fighting.

Other areas around the UK soon followed suit, but there was no national, co-ordinated approach. It was not until 1985 and the notorious riots at the Broadwater Farm Estate in London that the public at large could begin to see the potential behind the idea.

#### Ashcroft reward

As the investigation into the murder of PC Keith Blakelock went on and the police appealed for information from frightened residents, businessman Michael Ashcroft put up the money for a reward.

This led to discussions with the Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, resulting in Ashcroft and a number of business colleagues establishing a national operation in January 1988, known as the Community Action Trust.

The charity was renamed the Crimestoppers Trust in 1995. By then it had expanded to cover the whole of the UK as the other Crimestoppers' schemes foundered or became an integral part of the charity. Initially designed to mirror the ITV regions, its administration eventually moved to a local, countybased model with committees working in partnership with single police forces. The roll-out of this structure continues to this day: there are now 44 volunteer committees across the UK.

#### Murder

Michael Ashcroft **Inow** Lord Ashcroft, KCMG) has been Chairman of the Trustees of Crimestoppers for the last 20 years and remains a core donor to the charity. And, it is thanks to the grass roots support of the likes of our own John Davies and hundreds like him across the UK, that Crimestoppers has become such an integral part of driving down crime and catching up with those who might have thought they had got away with murder.

# Critical moments at Hinkley Point A

With nuclear power stations often generating column inches filled with controversial stories, a crisis of a different kind was averted in February.

Profile takes care of site security at Hinkley Point A. The twin reactor site in North Somerset closed in 2000 after 35 years. Management and operations contractor Magnox has been busy on behalf of the site's owners, the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority, defueling, dismantling and cleaning up the plant.

Security Officer **Sam Picton** is part of the Profile team responsible for monitoring the 19-hectare coastal site while these important works are carried out. On 23rd February, Sam had just completed his shift and was making his way across the car park when he spotted a body lying on the ground near a stairwell.

## Oxygen

Sam ran over and could see the man was in a serious condition. Without a moment's hesitation, he called Duty Supervisor **Paul Rowland** to make the 999 call. With an ambulance on the way, the Magnox Shift Leader was then informed and first aiders were on the scene within minutes, administering oxygen.

Paramedic and Fire & Rescue vehicles arrived to take over, with the ambulance reaching the patient shortly afterwards. The site's senior first aider was heard to comment, "Another five minutes and the casualty would probably not have made it."

### **Positive**

Recovering in hospital, our very grateful patient, named Chris, was full of praise for the Profile Officer and his Magnox colleagues: "In the cold light of day, I don't think the outcome would have been so positive without the quick response and excellent medical support which I received. My heartfelt thanks go out to all those involved."

## New Horizon

September 2015 was another significant landmark in Profile Security's ever-expanding portfolio of nuclear industry clients. The new contract with Horizon Nuclear Power covers the provision of manned guarding at their Gloucester Head Office, Sunrise House, as well as at their construction site, Wylfa Newyyd on the Isle of Anglesey in North Wales.

Horizon is an energy company developing a new generation of nuclear power stations in the UK. They are currently planning to produce enough electricity to supply around 10 million homes by building new plants, both at Wylfa on Anglesey and then at Oldbury, South Gloucestershire. Each power station could create up to 1,000 permanent jobs, with a construction workforce of around 4,000 workers for the majority of the time, potentially reaching 8,500 during peak periods.

Profile Security successfully transferred existing staff under TUPE arrangements from the outgoing security provider, as well as recruiting additional officers to supplement their number. Profile's National Infrastructure Operations Manager Jay Holliday commented, "We very much look forward to working with Horizon as they build the next generation of nuclear power stations. This new appointment clearly cements Profile's position as a leading provider of security in the nuclear sector."

## EMPLOYABLE ME

It is 12 months since Profile Security began piloting a partnership with Glasgow-based NC Resources Ltd. The scheme reaches out to local unemployed people and is designed to help them get back to work.

Resources already run a number of employability programmes for local government These organisations. initiatives retrain candidates from different walks of life. Some already have different skill sets, others come with existing qualifications within a range of professional sectors. What they all have in common is that they have fallen victim to the economic downturn sparked by the 2008 credit crunch.

## A way back

Many are looking for a route back into work in the security sector. **Gareth Cuthbert** and **David Neary**, the Directors of NC Resources, will train and license hopefuls, ready for the job market. Some even brush up on their first aid. As they are put through their paces, all candidates on the programme are made fully aware of the professional standards required of them.

For their part, employers have the chance to recruit candidates who are ready to begin work in the security sector. They get to meet them during their training and prescreen them for interview further down the line.

### **Expectations**

The partnership is paying off. So far, Profile Security has recruited 14 officers in South Lanarkshire and has them signed up on a variety of contracts.

Profile's Customer Service Manager for the Glasgow Area, **Brian Cooper**, was approached recently by NC Resources to speak to candidates on a new employability scheme. This one, piloted by Falkirk Council, was presented at Stenhousemuir Football Club. Brian offered current candidates an insight into the industry and set out expectation levels required for those hoping to join Profile as Security Officers.

### **Professional**

As a result of the scheme, staff retention levels are high, while there is no cost to recruit for employers. More importantly, the prospect of a job gives candidates the incentive they need to do well during their training course.

Brian commented, "The feedback from clients on some contracts where we have placed officers has exceeded the Area Manager's initial expectations." He concluded, "The level of professionalism, flexibility and conduct shown by these employees has justified our decision to engage in these programmes with NC Resources."



Guard Force Manager **Steve Robinson**, based at the Horizon site at Wylfa on Anglesey, set himself several goals. Said Steve, "I decided to run the Anglesey Half Marathon this year to get fit, raise some money for the Air Ambulance and – hopefully – to lose a little weight!". Steve successfully completed the run in 1 hour 52 minutes, raised £350, and lost almost two stone in the process!

# On watch for Sir Robert McAlpine

If you ever wanted evidence of Profile's tailored response to any security situation, then look north to Aberdeen. Construction firm Sir Robert McAlpine has been busy developing the Prime Four Business Park at Kingswell since 2012.

The firm appointed Profile to manage its security on the site from September that year. As well as a team of manned guards, Profile installed a wired CCTV network at the start of the contract.

#### **Thousands**

The first phase of the business park has seen the erection of three state-of-the-art office buildings and a training centre, creating a world-class hub for leading oil and gas

companies working in the offshore industry.

At one point, between 1,500 and 2,000 contractors were working on the site on any given day, giving Profile's security officers plenty to do.

As work on the park's buildings and its network of roads reaches completion, the site's security requirements can be now scaled down. With the number contractors down to about 300 visitors each day, security needs can be tailored to match: the total of manned quard hours is down but security levels have been maintained to the same high levels, thanks to an innovative solution.

### Spy in the sky

Profile has recently installed one of its mobile tower units. The camera mast can be operated remotely from our nerve centre in Leeds and at quiet times will be tripped by any activity. Profile's Business Development Manager **Victoria Ramsay** told *Silhouette*: "The tower has been a huge success. McAlpine's are more than happy with it and with Profile's continued levels of service. They all agree it's a cracking system."
